

### THE PROBLEM:

# Solving the global water and sanitation crisis requires more funding

The global water and sanitation crisis affects billions of people. Today, 2.2 billion people -1 in 4 — lack access to safe water and 3.5 billion people -2 in 5 — lack access to a safe toilet.



People in poverty — especially women and girls — feel the impacts of these crises first and worst. Women are disproportionately affected by the water crisis, as they are often responsible for collecting water for their families. Women and girls spend 200 million hours every day collecting water. This takes time away from work, school, and caring for family.



### Water is the primary way in which we will feel many of the effects of climate change.

Climate threats — like the more frequent extreme weather events we've been seeing — affect the water systems we all rely on. Millions of families in poverty live in regions where water access is limited, temporary, or unstable. They are less prepared to face the effects of climate change like temperature extremes, floods, and droughts.



### The global water crisis is a health crisis.

More than 1 million people die each year from lack of access to safe water and sanitation, and every 2 minutes a child dies from a water-related disease. Access to safe water and sanitation at home improves health and helps families protect themselves from illness and disease.



Access to safe water gives kids the time and health for school. Children are often responsible for collecting water for their families. This takes time away from school and play. Reductions in time spent collecting water increases school attendance, especially for girls. Access to safe water gives children the opportunity for a bright future.



Time spent gathering water or seeking safe sanitation accounts for billions in lost economic opportunities. \$260 billion is lost globally each year due to lack of basic water and sanitation. Access to safe water and sanitation at home turns time spent into time saved, giving families more time to pursue education and work opportunities that will help them break the cycle of poverty.

Water is the best investment the world can make to fight climate change, achieve gender equality, improve health and education, and break the cycle of poverty. Billions of people live without safely managed water and sanitation services around the world. With global threats profoundly affecting our economies, societies and environment, access to safe water and sanitation is fundamental to solving the world's most urgent global challenges.



### People living in poverty need long-term solutions.

One of the major barriers to safe water and sanitation is access to affordable financing. When people are living without these basic services, they have to pay for them — and they pay a lot more than we do, sometimes more than 20% of their income. They also pay with their time, health, and money for temporary solutions.

There's a gap in financing. According to The World Bank Group, \$114 billion per year, starting in 2016, is needed to achieve safely managed water and sanitation for all by 2030, meeting Sustainable Development Goal 6. Current investments for water and sanitation amount to \$28.4 billion per year. This represents a gap of \$85.6 billion.

Further, there is simply a shortage of quality, investible opportunities that impact people living at the base of the economic pyramid, and philanthropy can help play a critical role in connecting the dots.



### Solutions — like ours — are needed to fill the gap in financing for universal access to water and sanitation.

New sources of finance are critical to achieve universal access to safe water and sanitation. A radical increase in global financing is required, 3x the current annual investment. Bridging the financing gap and delivering safe and affordable access to water and sanitation will depend on smart and efficient approaches. Solutions that strategically use donor funds to attract private investment can fill in the financing gap. That's where Water.org comes in.

We use philanthropy to expedite and catalyze new investable pathways to solve issues at scale and bring in investment capital to solve these issues. Trust-based philanthropy is what has made this work possible — allowing us to innovate, test, fail, and get to where we are now. Philanthropic capital is key to bringing in more investment capital to solve the crisis, and investment capital is key to matching the scale of the solution to the scale of the problem.

impact — Prioritize monitoring the impact of our work related to improving gender equity and climate resiliency, creating new performance metrics to help ensure the effectiveness of our strategies and intentionally integrating climate and gender into our work.
